

- We can provide you with a list of veterinarians, boarding farms, and foaling options.

EDIGREE

AURELIUS MAXIMUS

Thanks in no small part to the great success of American Pharoah as a racer and sire, the male line of 2003 Belmont Stakes (G1) winner Empire Maker is now a hot item. This year, Louisiana is welcoming its first member of that line in Aurelius Maximus, who is standing for \$2,000 at Jay Adcock's Red River Farms near Coushatta. Sired by American Pharoah's sire Pioneerof the Nile (a son of Empire Maker who was a winner of the Santa Anita Derby, G1, and runner-up in the 2009 Kentucky Derby— Presented byYum! Brands, G1), this young stallion offers an attractive blend of performance, pedigree, and conformation.

Both top-class as 3-year-olds, Pioneerof the Nile and Empire Maker were advanced enough developmentally to race in major stakes at 2, with Pioneerof the Nile taking the 2008 CashCall Futurity (G1) and Empire Maker running a promising third in the 2002 Remsen Stakes (G2). Aurelius Maximus similarly showed ability at 2, winning a one-mile maiden special weight at Belmont by 7³/₄ lengths and earning a solid BRIS speed figure of 91 for his effort. He was sidelined due to physical issues after one start at 3 but came back at 4 to run multiple graded stakes winner Mr Freeze to a neck in the Hagyard Fayette Stakes (G2) at Keeneland, a race that some experts felt he might have won with a better trip. He was equally impressive in a Churchill Downs allowance race that year, defeating future Clark Handicap (G1) winner Bodexpress and Grade 2 winner Signalman.

Adding to his appeal, Aurelius Maximus springs from a deep family tracing back to 1962 Oaks Stakes winner Monade, the champion 3-year-old filly of her year in both England and France. As a broodmare for the King Ranch, Monade produced only one stakes winner, grade 1-placed Pressing Date, but she had seven stakes producers among her daughters, including three that produced grade or group 1 winners.

The most important of Monade's daughters was Remedia, an allowance-winning mare by one of the fastest horses in American racing histoty, 1968 Horse of the Year Dr. Fager. Remedia produced four stakes horses from nine named foals, headed by 1982 Maskette Stakes (G1) winner Too Chic. An extremely



fast daughter of the excellent sire Blushing Groom (himself a champion 2-year-old and miler in Europe), Too Chic in turn produced 1987 Ashland Stakes winner Chic Shirine and 1991 champion older female Queena as her first two foals, both by Mr. Prospector.

Chic Shirine did well as a broodmare, producing 1995 True North Handicap (G2) winner Waldboro and 1994 Ladies' Handicap (G2) winner Tara Roma, both by Northern Dancer's excellent sire son Lyphard. Tara Roma, in turn, is the dam of 2001 Go for Wand Handicap (G1) winner Serra Lake (by Seattle Slew) and grade 3 winner Cappuchino (by Capote) and the second dam of grade 1-placed grade 3 winner Coal Play (by Mineshaft). Through other daughters, Chic Shirine is also the second dam of multiple grade 1 winner Verrazano (by More Than Ready), 2014 TVG Diana Stakes (G1) winner Somali Lemonade.(by Lemon Drop Kid), multiple grade 2 winner Hungry Island (by More Than Ready), grade 2 winner El Padrino (by Pulpit), and grade 3 winner Soaring Empire (by Empire Maker).

Not to be outdone, Queena is the dam of 2000 Hollywood Derby (G1) winner Brahms and stakes winner Olympic (both by Danzig) and of La Reina (by A.P. Indy), winner of the 2003 Tempted Stakes (G3). La Reina, in turn, is the dam of seven winners including 2013 Swaps Stakes (G2) winner Chief Havoc (by



Giant's Causeway), multiple grade 3-placed Special Event (by Arch), and Aurelius Maximus.

Given the affinity shown by both Empire Maker and Aurelius Maximus' female family for the Seattle Slew line, mares returning Seattle Slew through sources other than A. P. Indy and mares carrying strains of the Missy Baba family to which A.P. Indy and Kingmambo both belong may be good choices for Aurelius Maximus. Grand-daughters or great-granddaughters of A.P. Indy need not be ruled out provided that the conformation match seems suitable and the mare has good feet (avoiding doubling up on the foot issues that troubled both Empire Maker and A.P. Indy), and other pedigree strains with potential for a good outcome may include Storm Cat, Arch, Danzig, and More Than Ready.

The regard with which Aurelius Maximus was held by his breeders (Martell Bloodstock and Fifth Avenue Bloodstock) can be gauged by the fact that as a yearling, a bid of \$625,000 was not enough to reach his reserve. While some of this was based on his stellar pedigree, his conformation was also a factor.

"Steve Asmussen [who trained the horse in his last four starts] described him as having 'an amazing physical," says co-owner Nathan Granger. "He's so balanced and has all the parts: huge hip, smooth shoulder, and beautiful neck. Mentally, he was a dream to train. Our stallion manager, Jay Adcock, says he has been all class in learning how to be a stallion. He's settled his first mares and they've been pronounced in foal."

An additional plus for the young stallion is the support he is getting from his connections. "I believe in the Louisiana breeding program and I've been in it virtually my entire life," says Granger. "Jay has a group of stakes producing mares, and he and I have acquired several other nice mares that we will throw at him to give him a chance to be successful. The response to him from other breeders has been wonderful, and we are thankful for that. We are also very thankful that Stonestreet Stables, George Bolton, and Peter Leidel have retained an interest in him and want to be part of the Louisiana program."

With that kind of support, plus a terrific package of ability, pedigree, and conformation, Aurelius Maximus will get every chance to prove he can be, as Granger hopes, "a game changer in the Louisiana program." The ONLY stakes placed son of SCAT DADDY Sire of

Louisiana Premier Stakes 2021 By Chad Cooper • Photos by Coady Photography

The 18th running of Delta Downs' biggest race program of the season Feb. 10 looked somewhat different than in years past. For the first time in the history of Louisiana Premier Night, the 10-race all-Louisiana bred stakes event took place during the daytime hours because of two hurricanes last summer that destroyed the infield lights. The only lights were the top four-legged stars that shined bright in the unusually warm February afternoon in Vinton competing for \$805,000 in total purse money. Jockey Gerard Melancon, who is chasing 5,000 career wins, won three stakes on the day as did Diego Saenz. Total handle was \$2,486,033, up from \$2.2 million last year.

Pressure can burst a pipe or make a diamond. Underpressure is a diamond. The 7-year-old son of Birdstone who won his first stakes race in 2017 at Delta Downs in the Premier Night Prince, successfully defended the \$125,000 Louisiana Premier Championship with consecutive wins in the track's biggest race of the season.

"Pressure is just a special horse," said winning

trainer Chris Richard. "He came into this race training really well and Gerard (Melancon) is a professional rider and sits perfect with him."

Double Star went straight to the front and led the entire field of eight by more than a length with jockey Jose Guerrero settings fractions of 23.88, 48.36 and 1:13.82. Melancon and Underpressure sat comfortably 8 lengths behind the leader and saved ground around the first turn at the rail.

As the field reached the backstretch, the defending champion picked up his pace and began to pick off horses. Melancon piloted the champ through traffic then angled out to go five-wide at the far turn and set his sights on the leader Double Star. With a 1/16 of a mile to go, Underpressure (\$4.80) drove past the front runner and proved to be the best with a 3/4-length victory in 1:46.60.

"Chris told me to be sure to get a good break

because he is a little lazy out of the gate," said Melancon. "He also reminded me that Underpressure likes to come around the horses and that's what we did. He is a smart horse. If the pace is slow, he will be up front. If it's fast, he knows to be further back. We had a pretty swift pace today and we sat 6-8 lengths back. He has been a super horse for Chris and Mallory and those kinds of special horses are hard to find."

Underpressure won for the 14th time (eighth stakes win and sixth with Melancon in the saddle) in 40 starts and is nearly the \$1 million earnings mark at \$838,182.

Winning owner Mallory Richard loves her horse. "He is everyone's favorite horse in the barn," she said. "You can give him peppermints and just love on him. He is such a happy horse. What a class act."

The final order of finish was Underpressure, Double Star, Jimi's a Star, Grand Luwegee, Pound for Pound, Cabo's Rumor, Nippy Red and Social Afleet.

Drama in the Distaff at Delta Downs. Louisiana Premier Day didn't go without a little controversy. Connections of Quikfast N Ahurry had to patiently wait out a jockey's objection in order to obtain her first stakes victory.

The daughter of Closing Argument stayed close to the pace set by Sarah's Passion during the one-mile venture, then veteran rider Gerard Melancon strategically moved up on the outside around the far turn and dueled with Saints N Muskets to prevail by less than a length to win the \$100,000 Louisiana Premier Distaff in 1:41.12.

Jockey Joe Stokes, of Saints N Muskets, claimed foul that Melancon and Quikfast N Ahurry impeded the two, which kept them from winning. The stewards took several minutes to review race footage, but disallowed the objection.

"My horse did lug in, but not enough to cause any issues," said Melancon. "My horse was way better today."

The final order of finish was Quikfast N Ahurry, Saints N Muskets, Snowball, Net a Bear, She's Gone d'Wild, Miss Charlie Sioux, Sebs Princess, Sarah's Passion, Smok'n Rita and My Little Jen.

Trainer Steve Flint said, "It's horse racing. Both fillies are good horses. This isn't her favorite track, but we had to take a chance because the purse money was too good to pass. Gerard did a great job with her."

Flint described Quikfast N Ahurry (\$12) as a "hard luck filly" who has consistently has endured bad racing luck. "She flipped in the paddock at the Fair Grounds last year before the Crescent City Oaks and still managed to finish second."

Whispering Oaks Farm LLC saw their filly improve to 5-12 with earnings of \$194,600.

She has since competed in the \$60,000 Red Camelia Stakes at the Fair Grounds on March 6, but finished last due to a troubled trip.

A ustralasia was a \$130,000 purchase by owner Jean Etienne Dubois at the Ocala Breeders' Sale, and after just three races, the 3year-old filly has already passed her sale price. The daughter of Sky Kingdom has been nothing short of perfect in her three-race career.

Australasia was much the best in the \$100,000 Louisiana Premier Starlet and got stronger as the race went on to score by 7-1/4 lengths to cover one mile in 1:39.45 for trainer Brad Cox.

"She is super easy to ride," said rider Diego Saenz. "She has a lot of talent. End of story."

Entering the gate at 1-5 odds, Australasia went head-to-head with Eileen Alexandra with fractions of 23.71 and 49.25 before she began to distance herself from her rivals to cruise along the bullring without a hiccup.

"Like Diego said, she does it pretty easy," said Ricky Giannini, an assistant trainer for Brad Cox. "She won her maiden by nearly nine lengths then had big win in the Louisiana Jewel Stakes here at Delta back in January."

Giannini added that the filly will next head to the Crescent City Oaks at the Fair Grounds, and, if all goes well, would then likely test some "deep waters".

Australasia (\$2.60) is now 3-3 with a career bankroll of \$133,200.

The final order of finish was Australasia, Eileen Alexandra, Winning Romance, Cilla, Lil Eva Jane and K R Lucky Day.

Trainer Lee Thomas said his jockey Ashley Broussard "made a clutch move" around the first turn to save a lot of ground, which was a bold move that helped her and Standing Perfect win a gritty Louisiana Premier Prince.

"It looked as if we were going to go wide, but she made an impressive move to get the horse in a better position," said Thomas. "That move likely won us the race."

Front runner G'wildcat broke out on top in the field of seven with modest fractions of 23.79 and 48.48. As the field reached the first turn, Standing Perfect, was wide in post 7, but angled in to save a lot of ground to keep within a length of the leaders.

As G'wildcat faltered up front, Jimmy Two Times, the other speed, stuck a head in front at the threequarter pole when Broussard swung four-wide to the outside and rallied passed a game Jimmy Two Times to win by less than a length.

The son of Half Ours covered the



mile in 1:41.21 and won for the third time in four outs for total purse earnings of \$138,500.

"This race was more competitive than his last start in Louisiana Legacy back in January," added Thomas. "There wasn't much speed in that race so Ashley took him to the front and never looked back. "The Prince was more of a challenge and I couldn't be happier." Thomas added that Standing Perfect (\$6.40) would likely head to the Fair Grounds and compete in the Crescent City Derby.

Final order of finish was Standing Perfect, Jimmy Tow Times, Wise Verdict, Drewhustle, G'wildcat, Sarah's Vision and Wise Anchor.

No Parole dominated in last year's Louisiana Premier Prince leading gate-to-wire to win by nearly 10 lengths at Delta Downs. After dipping his toes in several Triple Crown prep races, the 4-year-old sone of Violence returned home to Louisiana to rediscover the dominance he once

had and win the Louisiana Premier Sprint.

"He was great from start to finish," said winning trainer Tom Amoss. "Diego (Saenz) did a great job with him and I couldn't be more excited."

Saenz wasted no time when the gates opened. No Parole was

shipped to the front and never looked back. Though his lead wasn't as big as it was the last time the colt was in Vinton, he kept his challenger's at bay with swift times of 22.11 and 44.93. It appeared that Bertie's Galaxy would be a legit rival as the two reached the stretch drive, but No Parole said "no mas"



and dug in to drive clear and win by 3 lengths to cover 5 furlongs in an impressive 57.37.

"We had no problems," said Saenz, who rode the colt for the first time in his career. "He is a really fast horse with talent. He was fun to ride."

No Parole (\$2.20) improved to 6-9 for co-owners Maggi Moss and Greg Tramontin with a bank roll of \$375,866. "I'll let Maggie and Greg decide what's next," added Amoss.

The final order of finish was No Parole, Bertie's Galaxy, Double Barrel Man, X Clown, Priceless, Laughingsaintssong and Hooray Austin.

Jockey Diego Saenz fits 4-yearold filly Southern Beauty like a glove. Two peas in a pod. Saenz and the daughter of Calibrachoa are a perfect 5-for-5 after impressive run in the \$100,000 LAPD Matron.

"She always runs good for me," said Saenz. "She is impressive and was full of run."

The stakes race for older fillies and mares was hotly contested from the start. Most of the field battled for the early lead and none of the eight were able to sustain it for more than a quarter. Fractions of the 5-furlong race were 22.26 and 46.47.

Southern Beauty (\$5.20) stayed within striking distance then moved four-wide around the final turn and found another gear to explode past four runners to win by 2 3/4-lenghts in 59.10. The Allied Racing Stable, LLC filly now has five wins in eight outs for \$143,024.

The final order of finish was Southern Beauty, Miss Pat's Girl, Our Lost Love, Mr. Al's Gal, The Complete Court, Forty Nine Model, Schiff's Corner and Silver Squall.

"She ran a big race today," said

Jay Severs, who has been an assistant trainer for Bret Calhoun for more than 20 years. "Her and Diego work well together and it was nice to see her get her first stakes win in this type of race."


Greeley's Dealer entered the Louisiana Premier Gentlemen Starter on a 0-for-7 winless streak. Owner/trainer Karl Broberg has mastered the art of claiming a horse and moving him up in conditions only to find success, which is exactly what happened in the final stakes race of the program.

Broberg's second entry, the 5-1 Guitarzan, was fractious in the gates, yet quickly went to the front setting early course fractions of 23.55 and 47.98 then stopped. Multiple horses vied to take control of the route race including Outofthisgalaxy, who took over around the far turn and appeared to reach the finish line first. Then came Greeley's Dealer.

In true Gerard Melancon fashion, the pair made a bid three-wide to rally and drive clear of Outofthisgalaxy by 1 1/2 lengths in 1:47.89.

"Greeley's Dealer had a great stalking trip," said Melancon. "I was much closer to the pace than I thought I'd be, but he was doing it all on his own."

Melancon said he had one bit of instruction in the paddock from Broberg, "Ride him like Chris Richard told me to ride



Underpressure." It worked out.

The final order of finish was Greeley's Dealer, Outofthisgalaxy, Much Class, Purim King, Lucky Inferno, Krafty Boy, Liam Skye, Johnnysjourney and Guitarzan.

Greeley's Dealer (\$16.20) improved to 11-41 with a bankroll of \$253,635. Greeley's Dealer has since changed barns after he was claimed for \$5,000 on Feb. 22 at Delta Downs by trainer Eduardo Ramirez and owner Sandy Badeaux.

Joe Alfredo Castillo decided to take a chance on Kris T. by claiming the mare for \$5,000 last year at Evangeline Downs. What a decision it was. Castillo moved the daughter of Mass Media to the barn of Juan Larrosa and has won six consecutive races this season, all at Delta Downs, including the \$50,000 LAPD Ladies Starter.

"She is very easy to ride," said jockey Eguard Tejera. "She does a lot of stuff right. The only thing I had to do was be a little outside because she doesn't like horses to the outside of her."

In a short field of six, Kris T. left



the gate as the heavy betting favorite at even-money odds and dueled with 13-1 longshot Memory Magic through a half mile. Once Tejera was able to get her head in front, Kris T. found another gear and left her rivals behind to cover one mile in 1:41.09 win by nearly four lengths of Memory Magic, who was no match.

"This mare keeps getting better and better," said Larrosa. "Not much else to say. She is a good race horse."

Kris T. (\$4.20) improved to 10for-28 with earnings of \$176,245.

The final order of finish Kris T., Memory Magic, Blue Suade Guitar, Nana's Joy, Star Gaze and Yonna She Goes.

Wild Mallory put up an impressive 59.00 5-furlong time in her seasonal debut at Delta Downs last November, which was her first race in more than 16 months; a state-bred allowance race that she won by more than two lengths. It was only a matter of time before she would achieve black-type status.

"She loves this track," said trainer Ronnie Averett. "Her first race was a win here at Delta Downs and she became a stakes winner here at Delta. That's pretty cool."

The 6-year-old daughter of Greeley's Galaxy led from gate-towire to win the \$40,000 Louisiana



Premier Bon Temps Starter, but not without a little drama. Up more than 4 lengths down the stretch, jockey Diego Saenz dropped his whip as Diva's Ransom loomed yet held on to win by 1-1/2 lengths in a time of 59.39.

"It was a little warm and I was

sweaty," said Saenz. "I slipped in my reigns, but lucky enough to be close to the wire and get the win."

Wild Mallory (\$10.80) shot out of the gate on top then set fractions of 22.23, 46.11 and built a comfortable lead. She was never threatened until late in the race.

The mare has won 4 of 11 starts (4 of 6 at Delta Downs) with career earnings of \$90,535 for owner Gerald L. Averett, Jr.

The final order of finish was Wild Mallory, Diva's Ransom, Grillin, Have No Fear, Mi Copa Rebosa, Lady Rad, She's Seventeen, Andthebandplayedon and Starbuck Luck.

Madelyn's Wild Max is a popular fellow. The 10-year-old son of My Friend Max has been claimed multiple times throughout his 80-race career including several stops in the barn of Karl Broberg. Thanks to a massive come-frombehind effort, Madelyn's Wild Max is a stakes winner.

Skylas Gold led the full field of 10 through the 3/8-pole with a rapid 22.11 fraction before stopping. The 2-1 favorite Man Camp and others then battled for the lead when jockey Timothy Thornton and the son of My Friend Max began to rally wide from last to neck out Whacudposbylygowrng at the wire in 59.16.

"I knew it was going to be a fast pace, so I waited," said Thornton. "I was tracking the 9 horse (Whacudposbylygowrng) around the turn. I was lucky enough to outkick him."

Broberg said post-race that he claimed this horse specifically for the Ragin Cajun Starter. "I've had this horse a few times and I knew this race had a bunch of speed. When the horse his happy, he loves to run from behind and today he way happy. We gave him some time and we got paid."



The final order of finish was Madelyn's Wild Max (\$12.40), Whacudposbylygowrng, Aw Shucks, Halfmoon Reef, Cheers to Berti, Successful Ryker, Alluring Actor, Man Camp, Bayou Bode and Skylas Gold.

Since the race, Madelyn's Wild Max has gone on to win two more races at Delta Downs – Allowance Optional Claiming on Feb. 22 and Claiming \$4,000 on March 2. The 10-year-old gelded runner is 20-80 for lifetime earnings of \$379,858.

A LONG AND WINDING ROAD Love of Horses Unites Chris and Mallory Richard

The path to success in thoroughbred racing is a long and winding road. Louisiana native Chris Richard has paid his dues with hard work which earned the respect of many heralded connections in the industry. The rewards have been plentiful with some very special stakes winners and a finding a true partner in his horse-loving wife, Mallory.

Richard grew up in the Lake Charles area and had friends who raced Quarter Horses at Delta Downs. He loved the action and seeing the powerful athletes crossing the finish line.

"That's what got me interested," he admitted.

Education came first with Richard attending Texas A&M in College Station and earning a BA in Animal/Equine Science followed by his Masters in Equine Nutrition and Exercise Physiology. If you thought that his studies would keep him fully engaged, you are wrong! Richard was also a standout bowler and competed on the A&M Bowling team!

When he graduated, he moved to Kentucky and took on the role of private trainer for James McIngvale. The Houston-based furniture salesman, known as "Mattress Mack" is a nationally recognized supporter of breeding and racing and has built an iconic brand with his 2015 Breeders' Cup Sprint champion Runhappy.

Richard followed that with a five-year association with as an assistant to prominent Louisiana conditioner Tom Amoss. He handled duties for the Amoss barn in Illinois and Prairie Meadows.

"Chris was a very talented horseman long before he worked for me," said Amoss. "He recognized that we put the horse first and that we aim for consistency in our results. He always worked hard and operated with a lot of confidence."

Richard learned a great deal from that experience and was wellprepared to open his own stable in 2006. He had fond memories of Illinois breeder and owner Howard Nelson, who admired his work ethic during his tenure with Amoss.

"He was the first person to tell me that when I decided to go out on my own, that he would entrust me with some of his horses," said Richard. "I will always be grateful to him for having confidence in me."

Nelson's support was validated that year when I Got a Dream won the \$100,000 Jim Edgar Illinois Futurity, a state-bred stakes he had always hoped to win.

Richard ran horses at Prairie Meadows in Altoona, Iowa from 2008-2015. It marked a very significant milestone on a personal level as that is where he met his future wife, Mallory Greiner. She was attending Iowa State University and had a job working in the Prairie Meadows racing office. Richard had assembled a bowling team with an assorted group of race trackers and friends, so for their first date, he invited Mallory to go bowling.

"It might have been a risk because she said yes but told me she was not very good at bowling," recalled Richard. "I had to tell jockey Israel Ocampo that he was kicked off the team, but he was very gracious when I explained who was taking his place!" Mallory showed horses growing up, so the couple bonded quickly. Chris wanted to return to Louisiana to be closer to his parents, so the couple relocated to Vinton and were married in 2019.

The top horse in the Richard's barn is Underpressure, who they have owned and trained since 2015. Bred in Louisiana by McIngvale, Underpressure is a son Birdstone, out of the Charismatic mare Charming Colleen.

"As a 2-year-old, there was something about him," stated Richard. "I knew he had to be mine."

Richard has been patient with the handsome chestnut gelding, who began as a tall, gangly 2-yearold and has matured into a focused stakes competitor. On February 10, the 7-year-old Underpressure suc-

cessfully defended his title in the \$125,000 Louisiana Premier Day Championship at Delta Downs. His running style is to set off the pace and make a late run and nobody rides him like Louisiana veteran jockey Gerard Melancon. He loves the horse and values his enduring friendship with Chris and Mallory.

"I think the world of them," said Melancon. "Chris is a very sharp horseman and will never send a horse out that is not ready. That gives me a ton of confidence and we all get geared up when it comes to Underpressure."

Defending the title meant a great deal to Chris and Mallory.

"We were super ecstatic," admitted Richard. "It was his third race off a nine-month layoff. Horses like him are few and far between," he said. "It's not just that he runs well; he just impresses us because he finds a way to win!"

Underpressure with 14 wins from 40 starts has banked \$838,182 and is Richard's top earner.

"He's a once in a lifetime horse; as solid as they come," stated Richard. "I just try to not get in his way. His running style is to come from off the pace and he got the right set up in his victory."

Mallory also shared her love for Underpressure following his repeat in the Louisiana Premier Day Championship.

"To really understand Underpressure, you have to see him in the barn," she said. "He is so calm and gentle; will drop his head and let anyone pet him." Richard smiled as Mallory spoke about her admiration for the multiple stakes winner.

"I'd better be diplomatic and not say that he is spoiled," said Richard.

While Underpressure is the undisputed stable star, Richard also has a special place in his heart for several other horses who have soared to new heights under his care. Native Ruler, a \$25,000 claimer for owner Maggi Moss, won nine stakes; and Outta Tune, a \$5,000 claimer captured the Grade 3 Count Fleet at Oaklawn Park. Over the years, many owners have recognized Richard's talent and hands-on approach to caring for and training their horses.

While he runs at each of the Louisiana tracks, Richard has shipped horses to Keeneland, Oaklawn Park, Prairie Meadows, Canterbury Park and even Will Rogers Downs in Oklahoma.

The 49-year-old horseman has won 951 career races and hitting the 1,000th milestone will be special for both he and Mallory.

She devotes countless hours to re-homing the Richard-trainees as their racing careers wind down.

"I vet each prospective owner very carefully," explained Mallory. "It's never an easy process, but we believe in making sure our horses have a good home away from the racetrack."

Mallory fuels her creative side with designing custom saddle pads and showcases her talent on a Facebook page called "Horsing Around Sewing with Mallory".

The Richards own three Greyhounds, Belle, Piyo and Nala, that they dote on with as much love and attention as their horses.

"It helps that Chris and I get along so well," explained Mallory. "We both have agreeable personalities, and our hearts lie in the same place."

Her husband concurs and adds to her assessment.

"We've been together for 12 years," added Richard. "Mallory understands that being a horse trainer is like a college coach. You can't rely on past success; you have to be consistent every time and every year."

The couple still enjoys bowling on an occasional date night.

"She's improved quite a bit," said Richard. "Mallory can bowl between 150-170."

"I was terrible in the beginning," stated Mallory. "But now it has become our thing!"

In bowling lingo, a "perfect game" is 12 strikes in a row. While perfection may not be attainable in our sport, Louisiana Thoroughbred racing is very lucky to have this horse-loving couple setting such a high standard, on and off the racetrack!

Retired Racehorses Helping Alzheimers Patients

For 13 years, Kelly Cox Vicari cared for her mother at home as she deteriorated with Alzheimer's Disease. The small farm in Folsom always had horses on the place, and through trial and error Vicari learned that if her mother was having a bad day, she should send one of her five children out to catch a horse and bring it to the house.

Being in the horse's presence, simply petting it or brushing it, seemed to calm her mother and help her focus on her surroundings. "She changed so instantly," Vicari said. "It was just beautiful to watch the connection."

Eventually her mother passed away, but through word of mouth friends and other contacts asked to bring their relatives who were suffering from Alzheimer's to visit the farm. Vicari said she felt a void after her mother died. "I said, you know, there are only two things I'm good at. One is horses and the other is Alzheimer's. I'm going to put the two things together."

Vicari began to take gradual steps toward formalizing what had become a low-key form of therapy. She had a working relationship with Elite Thoroughbreds LLC. to retrain horses whose racing days were over and who were sound enough to have second careers. But not all of them could be rehabilitated, and it was from among the latter group that Vicari looked for therapy prospects.

What started out as a private service is now a more organized limited liability corporation that will begin charging fees based on how other forms of therapy are priced. "A Lil Bit of Heaven Stables" is the new sign at the farm entrance, and the business name is morphing from Equine Alzheimer's Connection to Equine Therapy Connection.

All of this had been moving forward in March 2020,

but the initial plans, like so much else, were stopped cold by the pandemic. A year later, Vicari feels that she's making a fresh start.

There's no riding in Vicari's therapy. People suffering from Alzheimer's or other forms of dementia, especially those who are elderly, can't maintain the

balance or the concentration necessary to ride. So the horses don't have to be sound, because they don't have to be ridden. They do have to be calm, gentle, unflappable and friendly to humans.

Take Bear. A Louisiana-bred son of 1999 Belmont Stakes winner Lemon Drop Kid, Bear's registered name is Clip Joint. He ran 18 times over three years; all but one start was a claiming race. He won nearly \$41,000 and two races running at Fair Grounds, Delta Downs and Evangeline Downs.

Then Bear was injured and had to be retired. At the time he was partly owned by the bloodstock agent Chad Schumer. Any thought of a second performance career ended for good when he contracted equine protozoal myeloencephalitis (EPM), a disease of the brain and spinal cord. Bear can never be ridden again. But his interaction with Alzheimer's patients is remarkable, Vicari says.

Bear, now 7, was her first therapy horse. Asked how she picks out therapy candidates from among the retired horses at Elite Thoroughbreds, Vicari can't really explain it. She can just tell, she says, within 20 minutes. Bear kept following her around in spite of his then poor condition. "He came here falling down with EPM."

A filly by Flat Out, with the race name Trattoria, ran one time at Delta and bowed a tendon so badly it wasn't known if she could be saved. "Chanel" as Vicari renamed her, lay down in her stall for hours at a time. When she finally started feeling better, it turned out that Chanel needed considerable work in the calming down department. "I brought her home and she turned out to be a wild thing. I would have never guessed that she would turn out to be the best therapy horse I have," Vicari said. "She is bombproof. Nothing scares her."

A year later, the filly came sound enough that Vicari's 14-year-old daughter Korrine has started her in eventing. Chanel is jumping two feet and learning dressage in addition to learning her manners as a therapy horse.

Vicari keeps three or four therapy horses at a time. Training is handled slowly. It includes exposure to new things and touching, because much of the client's therapy is touching the horse.

"Time and trust are monumental in training them," she says. "The practical side of the training is literally, they're like police horses." Horses are exposed to tarps, beach balls and whatever might jump out at them during walks on a neighbor's property.

Once trained, horses seem to know that their role is develop special relationships with the Alzheimer's patients, Vicari says.

Before the first visit, Vicari speaks to the main caregiver in advance to learn as much as possible about the client, including his or her memories and physical capabilities. She will meet the client away from the barn and ask about topics like families and children. Then she'll ask if the client would like to see some horses.

Safety is paramount; Vicari will never leave the client alone with a horse, and she will either hold the horse or put it in cross ties. The caregiver is asked to stay for the session. Vicari puts two or three horses in the barn and waits for the client to gravitate toward one of them. That horse is brought out, and a set of brushes is put out in a specific order.

The client won't realize it, but the order of brushes is actually a memory exercise. There will be questions about the brushes and the order in which they should be replaced. The goals are to work on memory retention and, using the horse, to help the patient focus on the moment and the world around them.

If things are going well and the client is up to it, he or she will be asked about going on a walk with the horse. Some might be interested in playing with the horse in a paddock, or exploring other objects in the old barn that might contain equipment they used at one time in their lives.

The idea is to let the patient experience things, not accomplish a specific goal. It doesn't matter if the patient doesn't put the brushes back in the right order or doesn't want to do something specific during a session. But often what someone does accomplish moves both Vicari and the caregiver to tears. The sessions can take on a spiritual element.

In the future Vicari hopes to make arrangements with local facilities that offer memory care and nursing care to bring the horses to the facilities and reach more patients. For now, she says, "I am humbled daily with God's abundant blessings allowing me the honor of serving others in such a unique way."

FOALING PROBLEMS - BE PREPARED

Most pregnancies in mares are normal and everything goes smoothly at foaling time. There are a few situations, however, when a mare has a problem and you need to be aware of it so assistance can be given—with more chance to save the foal.

Dr. Ahmed Tibary, DMV, Dip. ACT Professor of Theriogenology, Department of Veterinary Clinical Sciences, Washington State University, says breeders should be proactive and not leave anything to chance. "We will be observing the pregnant mare throughout her pregnancy, and as she gets closer to foaling date we watch her more closely," he says.

Most people can't be with the mare 24 hours a day, but barn cameras can be helpful to monitor mares. "I also tell my younger colleagues that the observations of mare behavior is critical; only the person who knows the mare can pick up on some of the subtle changes," says Tibary.

"The first stage of labor is variable. The mare may be pacing around, or mildly colicky. As we see more sweating and yawning, this is an indication that oxytocin has kicked in and the uterus is starting to contract," he says. The mare is feeling the changes.

Uterine contractions stimulate the foal to extend the front legs, aiming toward the cervix. The mare may get up and down a few times, which helps the foal get in proper position for birth. This first stage of labor can last for many hours or just a few hours. She should be observed continually, to make sure everything is normal. "If she seems to be in severe pain and rolling or starting to strain so much that her rectum is bulging out but the foal is not appearing, this is an emergency," Tibary says.

When the water bag—the allantochorion—breaks, there is a rush of water from the vulva. The mare is now straining and in second stage labor, and often lies down but is "sitting" sternal with her head up.

In a normal foaling, the amnion sac (a whitish-clear sac) will appear at the vulva with tips of one or both front feet and the nose within it. If a red bag is the first thing that appears (placenta coming first), this is an emergency because it means the placenta is detaching. Part of it is coming ahead of the foal—and his lifeline is detaching. In that situation you need to immediately cut that tissue with scissors and reach through it to the foal's feet and help the foal come through the birth canal.

"If there is no red bag showing, and the mare is progressing in labor, we expect her to show something at the vulva (hopefully the amnion sac) within 10 minutes of breaking her water, and the foal should be born quickly," says Tibary.

This second stage of labor is

extremely fast. A mare may foal within 5 to 30 minutes—usually between 10 to 20 minutes. If she goes beyond 30 minutes, this is a concern because the foal is at risk if it's taking this long.

"It's a swift process in the mare because the cervix is relatively soft and can dilate quickly. Once the fetus is bumping the cervix and starting to push through, this triggers an outpouring of more oxytocin, causing more and stronger contractions."

If nothing is showing at the vulva within 10 minutes of the water breaking, and the owner is experienced, this is when to start examining the mare to see if everything is ok and if the foal is aligned normally for birth. "This is when to reach in (with a sterile OB glove) to see if you can feel the feet and head," he says.

"Most of the problems we see during foaling, besides a red bag, would be during the 20 minutes of second stage labor. If we have a mare at our hospital for observation during foaling, we go by the 10-minute rule. When the first water bag breaks, by 10 minutes you should see feet and nose at the vulva, and in another 10 minutes you should see normal progression and then complete foaling," Tibary says.

"Things that are simple to check include whether the feet are appearing or not, and whether the head is there. Are the feet/legs on top of the head or is the head posi-

tioned normally (resting on the legs). If the feet are on top, this often results in rectovaginal tears as the foal comes out." Feet in this position are not aimed properly and may scrape the birth canal or even poke through it and into the rectum, tearing the partitioning tissue as the foal comes out.

"Many people rush to help deliver the foal, and this can sometimes be disastrous. The mare is straining and pushing, but she needs a little time to dilate; if we pull too soon we may tear the cervix. When the foal's nose is at the vulva, the thorax (ribcage) is still behind the cervix." The cervix needs to stretch and dilate fully, to allow the ribcage and hips to come through, since these are the largest parts of the foal.

"We must give the cervix time to fully dilate before we pull strongly, to avoid cervical tears. As long as we are still within that 20 minutes, we don't have to rush to help the foal—as long as the mare is not in severe pain," he says.

What help is given will depend largely on the experience of the person attending the birth. "One thing a person can do is be in phone contact with the veterinary clinic and let the veterinarian know, play by play, what is happening. The person helping the mare can take photos and text them to the veterinarian, if there are any questions about what is appearing. We can look at the pictures and assure the person that things are ok, or we can say this is an emergency or needs to be checked," says Tibary.

"Once the mare is in second stage labor, there can't be much delay or the foal's life is in danger. The time between rupture of the water bag (beginning of second stage labor) and the foal being born has high likelihood of losing the foal if it takes an hour or longer; we see a sharp decline in survival of those foals," he says.

"In foaling mares here at the hospital, we have them under constant observation and we don't let them go that long without assistance, but most of the mares we receive that are referred to us for help have gone too long because of the distance involved. We have a poor chance of saving those foals because there isn't time, by the time those mares arrive," he says.

"The owner needs to work with the attending veterinarian and know the abilities of that veterinarian in terms of anesthesia and surgery. You need to make a plan with that clinic for possible referral to a place with more advanced handling of a dystocia. Trying to handle a serious dystocia on the farm can be done, and we can resolve many of the simple complications, but you need to keep in mind the possibility that we might need to resolve a serious problem with a more advanced technique," he explains.

When dystocia is complicated and the veterinarian must do major repositioning of the foal within the uterus, the mare must be anesthetized to eliminate all straining. The veterinarian needs a window of time in which to work on repositioning and manipulating the foal without the mare crushing it or the veterinarian's arm with strong contractions.

"When we deal with a serious foaling complication, the danger for the mare and foal and the danger for the operator must be considered. This is a situation that can be dangerous for the personnel handling the problem, as well as for the patients. We need a spacious, welllit and protected area to work with the mare. If there is no plan for dealing with potential problems, we can have serious trouble. Even simple things like having a trailer ready to go, for an emergency, need to be prepared for," Tibary says.

"These problems don't occur often, but if it does happen, you need to be prepared because it is always an emergency," he says.

First Mare In Foal to Aurelius Maximus

The Louisiana-based Aurelius Maximus (Pioneerof the Nile–La Reina, by A.P. Indy) had his first mare confirmed in foal this week.

The durable Pay the Man (Bernstein), owned by Montgomery Equine, is among the first book of mares for Grade II-placed Aurelius Maximus. The Ohio-bred made 76 trips to the post in nine years at the races, winning 27 times (including 21 black-type races) for earnings of \$1,058,511.

Aurelius Maximus stands at Adcock's Red River Farms in Coushatta, Louisiana, for an advertised stud fee of \$2,000 LFG with consideration to approved mares.

First foal of Breaking Lucky born at Blue Star

The first foal of Graded Stakes Winning Millionaire Breaking Lucky, was born January 29 at Blue Star Racing in Scott, Louisiana. Bred by 4M Ranch and Blue Star Racing, the colt is out of Anea (Unbridled's Song / Desire to Excel, by Mt. Livermore) – who has already produced one winner out of two starters. Her dam, Desire to Excel, was a multiple stakes winner, graded stakes placed, and was on the board five out seven starts. She has produced three winners out of five starters, including one Black Type Winner.

"If there is one word that I can use to describe this colt, it would be STRONG," said Blue Star Racing Owner Dex Comardelle. "He is nicely put together, has all the right angles, has good bone, conformation, and lots of leg! If this first colt is any indication of how the rest of Breaking Lucky's crop will look, it's going to be an exciting year."

After breaking his maiden in only his second start, Breaking Lucky went on to win the Black Type Woodbine's 2015 Prince of Wales Stakes – the second leg of Canada's Triple. In 2016, he won the G3 Seagram Cup Stakes at Woodbine and went on to place in the G1 Clark Handicap, G1 Whitney Stakes, and G1 Stephen Foster Handicap behind Horse of the Year Gun Runner (Candy Ride). In total, Breaking Lucky was on the board in 10 graded stakes and two black type races, campaigned in two countries, and earned \$1,196,376.

"Breaking Lucky had an incredible, quality book of mares in his first year at stud with mares spread across the region," said Comardelle. "It's very special to have his first foal born here at Blue Star Racing – where he began his stallion career. We are excited about our new partnership with Pleasant Acres Stallions and will continue to support him with quality mares now that he is in Florida."

Hailing from the red-hot sire line of Lookin at Lucky (Smart Strike), Breaking Lucky also comes from an impressive female family. His dam, Graded Stakes Placed Shooting Party (Sky Classic), broke her maiden in her first race. She was second in the G1 Garden City Breeders' Cup Handicap and was third in both the G3 Pebbles Handicap and the G2 Nassau County Stakes.

Horologist Named New Jersey-Bred Horse of the Year

Multiple graded stakes winner Horologist has been named 2020 New Jersey-bred horse of the year and champion older female by the Thoroughbred Breeders' Association of New Jersey.

Owned by partners There's A Chance Stable, Medallion Racing, Abbondanza Parkland Racing, Thoroughbreds, Paradise Farms, and David Staudacher, Horologist started championship campaign her in California with trainer Richard Baltas and was later transferred to the care of Hall of Fame trainer Bill Mott in June. Under Mott's supervision, Horologist won the Molly Pitcher Stakes (G3) at Monmouth Park and the Beldame Stakes (G2) at Belmont Park. She also finished second in the Nellie Morse Stakes at Laurel Park and was third in the La Troienne Stakes presented by Oak Grove Racing and Gaming (G1) at Churchill Downs.

The daughter of Gemologist out of Cinderella Time (by Stephen Got Even), finished 2020 with \$345,334 in earnings. She has won seven of 20 career starts and earned \$715,439. Holly Crest Farm bred Horologist in New Jersey.

Longtime jockey Kenny "Chopper" Bourque, died Dec. 29 in Taylorsville, Ky., at age 67 from liver cancer.

The oldest of six siblings, Bourque was born in Abbeville, La., not far from Lafayette, where many Cajun-born riders learned to ride at unsanctioned racetracks called "bush tracks." He and his youngest brother, Curt, became successful riders.

Carl "Babyface" Mathieu, Sr.

Prentiss Neal McFadden

Prentiss Neal McFadden, 77, passed away on Tuesday, February 23, 2021 after a short illness.

Neal was born on July 23, 1943 in Ruston, Louisiana. He attended A.E. Phillips Elementary School and graduated from Ruston High

on Sunday, March 28, and while times were a bit more trying because of the lingering COVID-19 pandemic, simulcast business was exceptionally strong due to the tremendous support from both horseman and bettors alike. The meet, which kicked off with the traditional Thanksgiving Day opener on November 26, included 76 racing days and it was highlighted, as always, by the 108th running of the \$1 million TwinSpires.com Louisiana Derby (G2).

Trainer Ron Faucheux won his coveted first ever trainer's title with 40 wins, while dethroning four-time defending champion and Eclipse Award winner Brad Cox (37 wins) in the process. Both 11-time local titlist Tom Amoss (35), as well as Hall of Famer Steve Asmussen (33), made runs at Faucheux, with the former holding the lead for much of the meet, while Joe Sharp completed the top-5 with 23 wins.

James Graham not only repeated to win the jockey's title for the third time, but he obliterated his total of 63 wins last year, posting a seismic 88 on the board to hold off Adam Beschizza (85), with Mitchell Murrill (73) nabbing a podium finish as well. Colby Hernandez (69) bested his brother Brian (56) to round out the top-5.

The owners' race went down to the wire as well, with Godolphin edging Chester Thomas' Allied Racing Stable 13-12, with End Zone Athletics checking in third with 11. Maggi Moss (9) was fourth, with Evelyn Benoit's Brittlyn Stable, Wayne T. Davis (8), Whispering Oaks Farm, and Winalot Racing rounding out the top-5 with eight wins apiece.

Twelve horses won at least three races at the meet, with All Fact and Treys Midnight Moon leading the way with four each. Big Time, Dalika (Ger), Elle Z, Logical Myth, Maxfield all won two stakes at the meet. Both Handle and betting support were strong from Opening Day to Closing Day. As a result, from the strong simulcast handle, management was able to raise purses 10% across the board three separate times at the meet.

Oaklawn Increases Purses

On Tuesday March 9th, Oaklawn announced the largest mid-season purse increase in the history of the track. Over the final eight weeks of the season, Oaklawn is pumping another \$2.5 million into overnight races, including increasing top allowance races to \$110,000. The 15% across the board increase also takes maiden special weights to \$93,000 and raises the bottom purse to \$27,000.

"It's been an interesting year to say the least, but it is very gratifying to announce this purse increase nearly a year after shutting the race meet and casino down to fans because of the Covid-19 pandemic," Oaklawn President Louis Cella said. "I wasn't sure we'd get here a couple of weeks ago with all the bad winter weather, but our horsemen and fans are resilient. February ended with a tremendous weekend of racing and it was exciting to see fans back in the Infield last week. I have no doubt the final eight weeks of racing are going to be exciting, especially with some of our marquee races still to come."

Oaklawn's 2021 live meet continues through Saturday, May 1.

Texas Summer Yearling Sale Set for August 30

The Texas Thoroughbred Association and Lone Star Park at Grand Prairie have announced that the Texas Summer Yearling Sale will be held Monday, August 30, at the Dallas-area track. Entries are now being accepted with a deadline of June 21.

Despite the current health pandemic, last year's Texas Summer Yearling Sale resulted in an increase in gross sale receipts of more than 166% with approximately twice the number of horses consigned compared to the previous year. Even with the larger catalog, last year's sale posted an increase in average and median as buyers reacted positively to rising purses and breeders awards in Texas thanks to new legislation. strong the Southwest market is with Texas on the rise and Oklahoma and Louisiana continuing to have solid racing and breeding programs," said Tim Boyce, sales director. "We fully expect that upward trend to continue with our upcoming 2-year-olds in training sale followed by this yearling sale."

Last year the TTA introduced a consignor rebate program that rebates up to 50% of the consignment fee using funding from the passage of HB 2463, and that offer will again be in effect for this sale.

2021 Fact Book Available on The Jockey Club's Website

The 2021 edition of the Jockey Club Fact Book is now available in the Resources section of its website at jockeyclub.com.

The online Fact Book is a statistical informational and guide to Thoroughbred breeding, racing and auction sales in North America and is updated quarterly. It also features a directory of Canadian, international, national, and state organizations. Links to the Breeding Statistics report that is released by The Jockey Club each September and the Report of Mares Bred information that is published by The Jockey Club each October can be found in the Breeding section of the Fact Book.

Among the data included in the Fact Book are import/export and sales trends, all of which appear to have been affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. Namely, when compared to 2019, imports decreased 23.3%, exports decreased 35.6%, and mean yearling price decreased 19.9%. The Fact Book's racing data also indicates the impact of the pandemic on the industry.



NHBPA, State Horsemen's Groups File Suit To Halt HISA'

The National Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association,

together with state affiliates in Arizona, Arkansas, Indiana, Illinois, Louisiana, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Washington and West Virginia (Mountaineer) have filed a federal civil suit in an attempt to put the brakes on the Horseracing Integrity and Safety Act (HISA). The suit, filed in the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of Texas, names the Federal Trade Commission and several of its employees, as well as the people tasked with forming the Nominating Committee for the new federal authority.

The suit seeks to have HISA and a number of its elements declared unconstitutional, to enjoin defendants from taking any action to implement HISA, as well as nominal damages of \$1 and compensatory damages of any fees charged to horsemen by the new



authority.


The lawsuit is being handled by The Liberty Justice Center, a non-profit legal center "that represents clients at no charge and was founded to fight against political privilege," according to its press release about the case.

The crux of the suit is that plaintiffs believe HISA delegates legislative authority to a private organization and private individuals in violation of the U.S. Constitution. Although the new federal authority established by HISA will be overseen by the Federal Trade Commission, the suit points out that the FTC has the authority to reject or request modification to rules made by the authority but isn't allowed to draft its own rules and is not involved in enforcement of those rules.

Additionally, the nominating committee is tasked with picking the members of the new authority's boards, rather than the FTC. The suit claims that allowing the new authority's board to be appointed by a private group of individuals is unconstitutional because the U.S. Constitution requires the president, head of a department, or court of law to appoint officers in such circumstances. Not only that, the suit claims, "this private nominating committee was hand-picked by a small group of owners and trainers within the horseracing[sic] industry who supported passage of HISA, over the objections of thousands of owners and trainers, represented by plaintiffs, who will be regulated by HISA."

The suit also points to what it calls a lack of "intelligible principle" for the FTC to guide the new authority.

"HISA gives the FTC no standards upon which to base its decision to approve or disapprove rules proposed by the Authority. Its guidance is completely circular and unintelligible: it is told to look to rules proposed by the Authority and approved by the FTC to determine whether to approve rules proposed by the Authority."
